

Old Testament Lesson for January 30



Some time ago I will confess to having watched an episode of the Jerry Springer Show. I don't remember what the topic of that particular episode was, but at one point, one of the guests got up out of her chair and start trying to defend herself by repeatedly yelling at the audience, "YOU DON'T KNOW ME!"

The implication was that no one there knew what she had been through or her motives for her actions, (which were undoubtedly not appropriate material for a church newsletter.) Her words implied that only someone who knew her very well could talk to her in the way this audience did.

Too often, when we try to justify ourselves we end up using a similar strategy. The only problem is that this strategy never works with God. When we scream, "YOU DON'T KNOW ME!" God says, "**Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you. . .**" You can't be better known than that. God knows each of us intimately, better even than we know ourselves, and that can be scary. However, even though God knows things about us that we would rather keep hidden, God also knows the plans God has for us as

individuals and as a family of faith, and that too can be scary but also exciting!

In our Old Testament lesson for January 30th, God tells the prophet Jeremiah that he has been appointed as a "prophet to the nations." Jeremiah tries to protest that he is too young, but God will have none of it. When God is convinced that you're the right person for a task or ministry, who are you to argue?

Likewise, as brothers and sisters in Christ's family, God knew each of us before we were born, and God knew the ministry that he would call each of us. Not only that, but God also equips us for that ministry. But wait there's more! God also promises to be with us.

This month we are preparing for our annual meeting on February 6 to celebrate God's work in us and through us over 2021 and discern God's will for us for 2022. I look forward to walking with you as we seek to discern how God would have us serve our neighbors and witness the saving power of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

“HOW TO BE AN ANTI-RACIST” Book Study Begins January 9



In the introduction to his book, “How to Be an Anti-Racist”, Ibram X. Kendi says there is a problem with being “not racist.” He writes, “It is a claim that signifies neutrality: ‘I am not racist, but neither am I aggressively against racism.’ But there is no neutrality in the racism struggle.”

Starting January 9 at the 10:30 am adult forum, we will gather to discuss and wrestle with our role in standing against racism in its many forms. We will undoubtedly be pushed out of our comfort zones, but that is what the Holy Spirit does every time we grow into the people we are called to be. Come join us as we learn and grow together!

DAILY DEVOTION BOOK AVAILABLE

ANNUAL MEETING WILL AGAIN BE BOTH IN-PERSON AND VIA ZOOM

On Sunday, February 6 at 10:45 am, St. Philip's Lutheran Church will conduct our congregation's annual meeting. At this meeting we will accept reports from our staff ministry team and lay ministry team leaders, vote on lay leadership for the coming year, approve a budget.

We will also be voting how to distribute our tithe of capital campaign and miscellaneous income between various local and broader ministries. This year the council decided to distribute our tithe with top vote getter in each category getting 25% of the tithe, the two ministries with the next highest votes would each get 15% and the other ministries would receive 10% or 5%. The ballot will look like this:

1. Which local ministry do you most wish to support?

- Lewis House - emergency housing and assistance for victims of domestic violence
- Hastings Family Service - provides a variety of emergency and support services
- Food 4 Kids - provides weekend meals for children who don't have enough to eat

2. Which ministry beyond the Hastings area do you most wish to support?

- ELCA Domestic Disaster Relief- Aid to victims of recent tornadoes in Midwest
- Dakota County Matrix Emergency Shelter - provides safe place to sleep November-April
- My Very Own Bed (Minnesota) - provides beds for children transitioning to permanent housing
- Planting Hope - synod wide campaign to strengthen inviting ministries, renew congregations, raise up the next generation of leaders, and invest in a transformative project on East side of St. Paul.

There will be again be an option to participate via Zoom. This was made possible last year by a council action due to the COVID-19 pandemic. There will also be opportunities to discuss the budget in the weeks prior to the annual meeting through Zoom meetings as well.

We will still need a quorum to complete these important matters and we anticipate that everything should take less than an hour, so please plan on

participating. Like in previous years we will keep record of all those participating. You will note that there are green and red pieces of paper inserted in the newsletter that should provide enough materials for two voting members per household. If there are more than two voting members, any green or red paper will work or a paper with "YES" or "NO" written in large letters will suffice.

Please stay tuned for the Zoom links for our budget and constitution forums.

PLEDGE SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 21

Bringing forward one's "Grace of Giving" commitment card for the work of the Lord in the context of St. Philip's congregation is a solemn exercise.

On Christ the King Sunday, November 21, members were invited to bring their commitment card forward and place it into a prepared basket. Deborah Dreher presided during the in-gathering.



At the time of this printing, 107 households have responded which represents nearly \$280,000 in pledged giving to the General Fund and \$131,000 to the Capital Fund in 2022. There will be a slight change in these numbers as the year closes.

Developing a budget is done with pledged giving and non-pledged giving which is based on previously experienced numbers.

The Stewardship Ministry Team thanks every household who returned their card with whatever decision was fitting for them. There is "Grace in Giving" and its alive at St. Philip's.



BAKE AND SOUP SALE HAD A GOOD DAY

On Saturday, November 25, a new version of the annual Soup Lunch and Bake Sale was offered to members and the public. The "eating in" experience was eliminated. Quarts of two kinds of soup were sold for \$8 as a carry out item. Baked goods sales were conducted as usual but with a larger space allowed for them. Some members had graciously made lefse at home which has been the draw to the sale in previous years. No corporate lefse making was done. Proceeds from the sale totaled \$4,006 which was regarded as very strong given the times we live in. WELCA uses profits such as these for both external and internal mission driven purposes. Bibles for St. Philip's youth, supporting teens going to the National Youth Gathering, tuition for a woman student in Tanzania who will become a teacher, plus disaster relief and other human needs managed by Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota.

WELCA offers its thanks to the membership for their donations of goods and financial resources. Thrivent Financial provided \$250 toward expenses based on its Action Team program, which was managed by Margaret Goderstad.
