

"Therefore, to keep me from being too elated, a thorn was given me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to torment me, to keep me from being too elated. Three times I appealed to the Lord about this, that it would leave me, but he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." So, I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me. "

2 Corinthians 12:7b-9

There is a widely circulated idea that when events turn against us, it's divine retribution for sins of the past. The boss announces that "company 'downsizing' means *you*." The doctor delivers a chilling diagnosis of chronic or life-threatening illness. The dull ache in the lower back tightens its grip, squeezing out thought and sleep.



Is this divine justice? Punishment for things done and left undone?

Paul never even hints at such a possibility. He testifies that his struggle with physical vulnerability revealed to him the nature of the power of God: this is a power that manifests itself in this world in and through weakness. One need not embrace the idea that God "plans" our difficulty or suffering to agree that God's power can sustain us even when we are suffering. Power viewed through the cross is the power that can make us whole. Maybe, like us, the Corinthian Christians hungered for deeper spiritual experience.

Such hunger, in itself, is legitimate. Contemporary Christians are rediscovering such spiritual resources as contemplative prayer and walking the labyrinth. But for congregations as well as for individuals, spiritual roots may grow deepest and strongest as we struggle together through experiences we cannot, and would not, construct or choose. We have to risk trusting each other at new levels, pray with much at stake, and practice the kind of Spirit-fueled compassion and ingenuity that finds a way where there appears to be no way.

I think this is especially true as we continue to escape the clutches of a pandemic that affected virtually every aspect of our private and public lives. For some of us, it was nothing more than a 15+ month long inconvenience. For others, it meant the loss of a job, or even worse a loved one. Safety measures and social distancing prevented us from worshipping and grieving as we would have liked to do. For all of us, it meant working, learning, shopping, worshipping, and everything else in a new and unfamiliar way.

Right now we are all easing back into what was familiar, each at our own pace. Each week we gather in person and online as a group of broken individuals yearning for wholeness, each bearing our own burdens. Families and individuals all have their "stuff". You know your "stuff" and I know mine. And make no mistake, our congregation has "stuff" too.

The culture is eyeing the churches these days, testing our credibility. We may imagine that we cannot think about public witness until our "stuff" is all resolved, and everyone feels comfortable worshipping in person. Right now, we don't necessarily feel strong enough on our own. But it may be precisely our weakness that presses us into the kind of engagement with each other and with the Spirit that can turn us, sooner rather than later, away from self-absorption and outward to the world God loves. Even in our weakness, maybe even because of it, we become credible witnesses of saving news in this world full of thorns, and stuff.


Game Day: Monday, July 26 at 7:10 pm with the Detroit Tigers

After several months of not meeting, we have resumed using our crafting skills to benefit others. The first and third Thursday afternoons each month will find a group in the Room of Requirement (The unfinished room at the far end of the narthex between the offices

and the main parking lot) from 1:00 pm until around 4:00 pm or so, tying quilts and doing other sewing related projects for Lutheran World Relief and other good causes. Drop ins are welcome for however long you can stay. If you can tie a square knot, you have a skill we can use! If that isn't your thing, we also have cutting, sewing, knitting or crocheting projects to do at church or take home. Although much of our time is spent tying quilts for Lutheran World Relief, we have also made tied fleece blankets for baptisms at St. Philip's and for Lutheran Social Services Camp Noah, fleece hats for homeless shelters and new immigrants, school bags for Lutheran World Relief School kits, and knitted and crochet prayer shawls among other things. SCHOOL SUPPLY DRIVE

After a year off due to COVID-19, we are again collecting school supplies this summer and fall for Lutheran World Relief School kits. Because our backpack makers stayed busy last year during COVID, we have over 100 backpacks ready to fill! During the month of August, we will be collecting 70 page, single subject spiral notebooks (4 needed for each kit), blue or black pens (5/kit), pencils (5/kit), pencil sharpeners (1/kit), erasers (1/kit), 30 centimeter rulers (1/kit), blunt school scissors (1/kit) and boxes of 16 or 24 crayons (1/kit. Crayola brand preferred, as some generics melt too easily during shipping). Items must be new and free of military or religious words or symbols, including no camouflage. Consider picking up a few extras when passing the school supply displays in your favorite store when they have their end of summer "Back to School" specials. Most needed in past years have been scissors and notebooks. Please place in kind donations in the shopping cart that will be in the narthex from July 18 through the end of August. Any monetary donations designated for this project placed in the offering plate or the deposit box by the office will be used to purchase additional supplies or given to LWR for shipping. The backpacks will be packed between services on Sunday, September 12, as part of the Rally Sunday celebration and everyone is encouraged to participate!

What do you think of when you hear the names: Shiprah, Puah, Rahab, Achsah, and Tamar? No, these are not the top trending girls names this year.




At least, I am pretty sure they are not. However, these are the names of women we will be learning about and discussing at our Campfire Bible Studies!

COLUMBARIUM UPDATE - A columbarium is a beautiful structure, containing niches (compartments) to hold the ashes of our loved ones. For more than sixteen months the team has been planning and making decisions, work that has mostly been behind the scenes, Finally, during the first half of June, we have much visual progress to report. The concrete work, scheduled to be completed by Memorial Day, was delayed a week because of rain resulting in a domino effect for the other vendors. The 80-unit columbarium was delivered and assembled on June 14-16. Check out photos of the work completed for these two projects.

During the last half of June, our plan was to complete the brick work on the back and sides of the columbarium and install two benches, a planter, and the patio pavers. When these projects are done, we will focus on the landscaping design that has already been approved. For a closer look, feel free to visit the east side of the church property. Presales began in December, which will help to offset some of the costs in excess of the generous donation for the columbarium made in early 2020. A dedication will take place after all the work has been completed, probably sometime in September.

A table has been set up in the narthex with a rendering of our columbarium, a sample niche, sell sheets for the taking, and application folders for those who are interested in leasing a niche. KEEPING CONNECTED

Greetings from Cindy and Ron Toppin. We have been members of St. Philip's since 1978 when we moved to town so Ron could become the manager of Perman's in Westview Mall. We moved here from Minneapolis where Ron was working at Dayton's and Cindy was a Speech Pathologist at St. Paul Rehabilitation Center (later called Lifetrack).



We are both originally from southern Minnesota small towns, Ron from Winnebago and Cindy from Owatonna. We met at Gustavus and the rest is history.

We live in a 108-year-old house in the old part of Hastings, just one block from the other ELCA Lutheran Church. But we loved the feel of small community and friendliness at St. Philip's and joined there. One of my earliest memories of the church community reaching out was when our son, Chris, was born; we received a meal once we got home and Ruth Jackson even made a cake that said: "Welcome Chris!"

Within a year, Cindy was on church council (once they spot you, they never let you go!). Ron and I have both served on council in many capacities, including Treasurer and President. We have been involved in Sunday School, Confirmation, VBS, Call Committees, Worship and Music, Stewardship, the Garage Sale and many other activities. Most recently Ron is on the Finance Ministry Team, and Cindy is the HR Ministry Team representative on Church Council.

We participated in a Cursillo retreat in the late 1980's and have been involved ever since. Our Saturday morning Bible studies for men and women are an outgrowth of that ministry. The St. Philip's Cursillo Community may be one you are not familiar with, but if Cursillo/Via de Christo retreats come back after the pandemic, we urge you to consider it. The retreat helps you truly experience the love of God in your life. One example of that love is how these church friends supported us after Ron fell down the stairs and broke his neck. It was a terrible time, with me working in St.

Paul and two small children. People mowed our lawn, gave Ron rides, took the kids to baseball, and loved and prayed for us.

Today Ron and I are happily retired, he from Banking and me from Nonprofit Administration. Our two kids and 5 grandkids (all under the age of 8) live in the metro area so we see them often. Our retirement adventures include a lot of travel and most recently during the pandemic, buying a new sailboat with the Cruses and sailing in Lake City, where we have a condo. So we may not see you as much in the summer, but we are always here in spirit.

We continue to thank and praise God for the "family" we have at St. Philip's and to remember you all in prayer.

We are Dave and Diane Filkins and have been members of St. Philip's for about 45 years.

This truly has been our church home in Hastings without ever second guessing our decision to join this church.



When we walk into St. Philip's it feels like home with friends all around. These friendships continue beyond the church and have been a blessing to us. We have two boys, Greg and Brian. They received their baptism, went to church school, and were confirmed at St. Philip's. The friendships that they made at church have been lifelong and important in their lives. We are now blessed with two very nice daughters-in-law and three precious granddaughters. Addie is 5, Lilly is 3, and Maggie is 1 ½. They are a true joy in our lives and fortunately live relatively close by. Both of us are retired. Dave was a veterinarian in Hastings for 46 years. Diane was an elementary teacher in Hastings for 35 years. We enjoy cooking together as well as fishing, camping, downhill and cross-country skiing, ice fishing, and snowmobiling. We love sharing these interests with our friends. We look forward to being all together again at St. Philip's and to share Christ's love with one another in person.

When Gerri Lundby left a message on my answering machine asking me to write about my experiences at St. Philip's, my initial reaction was "no I don't think so." But that night as I tried to get to sleep I recalled so many great things about St. Philip's, I decided to say "yes" and share a few of my thoughts.



I came to Hastings in 1970 a first year Home Economics teacher (now called a FACS teacher) with a strong Lutheran upbringing from Heron Lake, Minnesota. 4 years later I was married to George Kimmes and settling into a house on 19th Street. I decided it was time to check on St. Philip's.

At the get-to-know you picnic at Frank and Norma Mossman's home, I was introduced to Patty Todnem. Someone mentioned I was from Heron Lake and Patty, who grew up in Windom, exclaimed "You're Darla Libra." We had been in 4-H Dress Revues at the Jackson County Fair. There were also several teachers and neighbors who were members of St. Philip's - the VanVleets, Schultzs, Stockmans, Christensons and Andersons so I immediately felt welcome.

After 4 years of marriage George and I had our first child Mitchell. Mitch, now a science teacher, married Stephanie Seagren, a music therapist, and has two daughters, Hayley 4 years old and Everly 1 ½. Andrew came 2 years later. Andy is married to Elizabeth Aslesen and has 6 kids, Lilly 14 years, Laila 14 years, and Caitlyn 14 years, Isabella 12 years, William 7 years and Christopher 1 year. Andy is a pharmacist and Elizabeth is a Physician Assistant. Ben remains single and works at Northland Golf Course in Duluth.

When the boys were younger they enjoyed the St. Philip's preschool, later Sunday School, Confirmation, and in High School Mission Mexico trips. All the fund raising activities before the trips really helped the kids and parents get to know each other and bond. There was some deep spiritual growth by many of the participants. Listening to the testimonies of the returning participants was very moving.

A side note — the 1993 Mission Mexico trip was the largest mission trip because it involved several youth groups including one not from Hastings. So it was

necessary to caravan in 3 busses and a van. I was one of the adult drivers in the van. A Patrolman pulled the van (which was driving between 2 of the busses) over for speeding. I was driving the van. All 3 busses stopped and pulled over too. Gordon Gathright got out and the patrolman asked "Are you with this convey?" Gordon explained where we were headed and what our mission was. The officer wished us well and recommended slowing down —no ticket. It was a God thing.

During different stages of my life I have been involved with different activities—Sunday School teacher (It's fun to see former students and former Sunday School Students now parents and bringing their kids to church) Woman's Bible Study, Women of ELCA (WELCA) locally and at the Synodical level and the Churchwide level. I have attended 7 Triennial Conventions. The Triennial Gatherings are extremely inspirational, especially listening to some of the International speakers.

Other fond memories are the Candle Light Buffet usually emceed by Bert and Margaret Goderstad. The evening was very entertaining and so full of Christmas cheer.

I appreciate the more concise annual meetings that we have now. At one time they lasted most of the afternoon because we had brainstorming and round table discussions. There was one that I don't think anyone in attendance will forget when a "streaker" came into the meeting room with his pants around his ankles and proudly announced proudly "Mommy I went potty in the bathroom."

Other activities I have been involved include delivering Meals on Wheels, Third Thursday Philip, Worship Lectern, Worship Greeter, Usher, Worship Coordinator, Church Council, dramas during Lent and making quilts for Lutheran World Relief.

Why do I do these things? Because "I believe God created me and all that exists. He has called me through the Gospel and enlightened me with His Gifts" (and He wants me to share in the fun of growth and fellowship). "This is most certainly true" - A little quote from my confirmation days that still rings true.
