Wednesday Night Zoom Bible Study Begins Wednesday, April 17 at 7:00 pm Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. ⁸Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. ⁹God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. ¹⁰In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. ¹²No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us, and his love is perfected in us.

1 John 4:7-12

Who will deny that love is the dominant theme of the age in which we live? Everyone talks about love, though not everyone practices it.



The Christian faith has always emphasized two very important things – truth and love. Jesus Christ himself was the preeminent expression of both of these – truth and love – held in perfect balance. Jesus was fully the expression of truth, and fully the expression of love.

Three times in this passage the phrase "love one another" occurs. It is here in Verse 7, also in Verse 11 ("Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another"), and in Verse 12 ("No man has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us..."). Obviously, the primary exhortation here is this three-fold repetition, "love one another." The nature of this love is inherent in the very statement John makes. "Love one another," he says. Thereby it is indicated that love is not to be only for those who are pleasant to us, or who are nice, congenial, clever people. We are not to love because people are lovable, but because each is another.

Everyone is a person, capable of a unique relationship to God, and therefore not a *thing* to be dealt with impersonally, or to be opposed or accepted as it suits our purpose, but a living, breathing, searching creation of God, just like us. That is why we are to love one another, without regard to what that person is like. This defines what love is meant when the Bible talks about love. True love is an interest in and a concern for another person, just because she is a person, and for no other reason. It does not matter whether they are rich or poor, black or white, old or young, male or female, Republican or Democrat; it makes absolutely no difference. He or she is a person!

Love takes no notice of what a person is like, or what he does, or how she dresses, or how he looks, or anything about her background. It sees one thing only, and that is, "Here is another person, another one like me with all the longings, the heartaches, the problems, the aspirations, the hopes, dreams, and frustrations of life like me. Here is another one, struggling as I am to face the problems of life. What can I do to help?" That is love.

In these verses we have this great exhortation to love one another because, as John marvelously declares, that kind of love can only originate with God. This kind of love is "of God." In fact, God is this kind of love, God is love. Therefore, wherever the life of God is present that love is found. And if that love is not found, the life of God is not present. The argument is clear, is it not? It is so simple. It is no good claiming that you know God if the love of God is not found in your life. If you cannot treat people objectively and see through the irritating qualities that may offend you to be nice to them because they are in need of love; If your reaction to those who offend you is one of opposition, rejection, and instant antagonism; Then it is no good saying you belong to him. That is not God's life, that is not God's love. John's argument is, if the life of God is present in us, then the love of God will be there too.

St. Philip's to Partner with Interserve Ministries! Discovery Team is Next!

At our March 18 council meeting, our church council unanimously voted to enter into a partnership with Interserve Ministries to aid us in our ministry with children, youth and families. Interserve's process will help discern and create a sustainable model for moving forward in the next chapter of our ministry.



InterServe has Associates that come on staff for approximately 6 - 12 months. These are ministry professionals who can help carry out the current children's, youth and family ministry programs and assist in the visioning process and change that may take place during any type of transition. They believe this interim time can be a healthy and exciting process for a congregation, as we work together to turn anxiety into discovery and excitement for the future. We also believe that building a solid children, youth and family ministry model is essential in the longevity of an incoming staff person.

Our next step is forming a Discovery Team of 8-10 people, both youth and adults, who will work with the InterServe associate during their time in our congregation. This group will help plan and implement some of the CYF ministry events and will work through some of the stated tasks of the interim process. This team will also serve as a visionary group of people who are excited about the future of our children, youth, and family mininstries.

As stated above, we need several youth to share their ideas and visions as well as build ownership within our youth. The only requirement to be on the Discovery Team is to have a passion for faith development in young people and hold the needs of our youth ministry in their best interest.
