

So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; look, new things have come into being! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ: be reconciled to God.

> 2 Corinthians 5:17-20 From the 2nd Lesson for the 4th Sunday of Lent



"So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us." That verse is printed on every newsletter of the three-point parish I served in Cashton, Wisconsin the first ten years of my ordained ministry. Aptly enough, the newsletter was titled "The Ambassador."

However, as Lutheran Christians, we believe that all expressions of the Church and its varied ministries are ambassadors for Christ, sharing the Good News, caring for those who are hurting, and advocating for the voiceless and the powerless.

That is why I feel I must address something that has happened on February 1. I have been your pastor for almost ten years, and I am aware that we are a congregation that includes passionate Democrats and passionate Republicans, and I consciously seek to find the things we all can agree upon while acknowledging our differences. (And for the record, I am a registered independent who has voted for both parties.) One thing we can agree on is the eighth commandment that states, "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor."

On February 1, Mike Flynn, a retired general and previous adviser to President Trump, posted on X (formerly Twitter) "Now it's the 'Lutheran' faith (this use of 'religion' as a money laundering operation must end)" and inferred that Lutheran organizations like Global Refuge (formerly Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service) and Lutheran Services in America receive way too much federal grant money with no transparency regarding its use. Elon Musk shared this post adding the comment, "The @DOGE team is rapidly shutting down these illegal payments." DOGE is an acronym for the Department of Government Efficiency, a new government advisory group co-led by Musk and created by President Trump's Administration.

There is absolutely nothing true or factual about Mr. <u>Flynn's statement</u>, and he does not offer any evidence to support his libelous claims. Every Lutheran Social Services organization undergoes annual independent audits to maintain transparency. Whether it be in Minnesota or LSI of Iowa, or LSS of Wisconsin and Upper Michigan or any of the other state LSS organization, LSS provides public access to their financial statements and audits on their websites.

LSS across the nation provides resettlement services to legally admitted refugees, including Hmong and Afghan allies who risked their lives to protect US troops, as well as persecuted Christians and other minorities. All these refugees have been vetted and approved by multiple US government agencies before traveling to our country.

LSS is also one of the largest agencies that help facilitate adoptions as well as provide counseling services, disability services, foster care, resources for homeless youth and many other vital services that address the needs of our most vulnerable neighbors. There is no "laundering" going on.

This issue is not about being a Republican or a Democrat. It is about speaking the truth and about advocating for the powerless and hurting. Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, the presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America has issued a video message in response to these false allegations that can be found on YouTube.

The truth is that there are also many nursing homes and assisted care facilities across our nation that are operated under the umbrella of Lutheran, Catholic, Methodist, Presbyterian and other Christian affiliated organizations. In Hastings, the Benedictine Living Center and Hastings Senior Health and Living (formerly Augustana) are two examples. These facilities receive most of their funding from Medicare and Medicaid and that does indeed add up. But it is not "money laundering" or illegal or fraudulent.

There can be (and, in fact, are) differences of opinion in our society on the role of government in providing human services. However, up to now, there have been laws established by Congress, and policies implemented by the various departments of the executive branch, and opinions of the Supreme Court, that have favored the usefulness and value of the government contracting with religiously-affiliated agencies and institutions to provide such human services. These agencies provide services regardless of the religious affiliation of those served.

Wherever you are on the political spectrum I encourage you make your voice heard, speaking the truth in love (Ephesians 4:15) as we all continue our call as ambassadors for Christ, trusting that God is indeed making his appeal through us.



Lenten Book Study

Lenten Book Study begins on Wednesday, March 12 immediately after the Lenten service.

What We Remember Will Be Saved: Story of Refugees and the Things They Carry tells the stories of six women and men who are forced to escape war in Iraq and Syria and who carry the worlds that they left behind with them when they



flee. A woman named Hana sews the story of her Aramaic- speaking city into a dress. A young man named Ferhad saves the songs of his Kurdish community. Munir saves his goodness after escaping the violence of Mosul; helping ordinary people in a camp in Lesvos. Adnan and Ghadir, two pharmacists from Aleppo, rebuild their pharmacy in the ruins of war. And Qassem, a Yazidi from Mt. Sinjar, rescues his family on a mountain, and then saves the story of what happened so that it will never be forgotten.

Together, their stories paint a portrait of a religiously and culturally diverse corner of the Middle East disappearing, and the people saving it with their stories. Each voice puts us in front of an essential question: What is the deepest part of ourselves, the one thing that can never be taken from us?

This book is for everyone. Today, one in every 69 people on earth is forcibly displaced. The author, Stephanie Saldana, wants readers to experience the reality that refugees are teachers and students, artists and musicians, farmers and chefs. The author says, even in the face of immense violence and loss, "there is always something small to be carried, some act to be done, and that these little things transform history in ways we only later understand."

The book is available at the Hastings Public Library or online. We will meet for five sessions during lent.

Synod Summer Internships Applications Now Accepted!



The synod is now accepting applications for the third summer of its internship program for young adults ages 17-21. Up to ten interns will serve at sites that focus on feeding the hungry, working with refugee/immigrant populations, social work, working with children, community gardening or working with the elderly. The interns will receive a \$4,000 stipend, funded by the synod's Planting Hope Campaign, while working 20-24 hours per week, June 9-August 22. The interns will also meet weekly as a group for learning, conversation and worship. Applications will be reviewed as they are received so early applications provide the best opportunity for selection.

This great program provides young people a meaningful summer work experience, along with an opportunity to learn, serve and reflect. Pastor Bristol Reading, who serves as the pastor at St. Luke in St. Paul, will again coordinate this program.
