

Psalm 67

A professor once said that the sixth Sunday of Easter may feel a bit like the twelfth day of Christmas --



officially still in the zone but, practically speaking, most people have moved on. All the presents have been opened, the candy is long gone, I have proclaimed the Easter story, the most familiar Easter songs have been sung, the lilies have either wilted or been taken home.

Yet, our psalm for the sixth Sunday of Easter is so very appropriate for this season. Psalm 67 asks for a blessing that will make the Lord's way "known upon the earth," and God's "saving power among all nations". Surely that prayer is answered in the Resurrection of Christ!

This psalm works well for Easter. It declares that God's blessing -- and there is no blessing greater than Easter -- is for *all* people. We might be tempted at this particular time of year to feel deflated as the Easter crowd has drifted away. Psalm 67 does not go there. It imparts joy and prompts us to spread the Easter message everywhere. Easter reveals "the Lord's way as savior" and that "way" leads through death to resurrection, through darkness to light for the entire world. Psalm 67 reminds us that God's blessing is moving throughout the world to embrace "the nations" and "the peoples" of earth.

The Psalm is global. Its invitation is universal,

resounding in verse 3 and again in 5. "Let the people praise you, O God; let <u>all</u> the peoples praise you." Verse 4 asks "the nations" to "be glad and sing for joy." Imagine being in a huge concert hall where massed choirs are singing from every side. The nations sing for joy because God judges *the people* with equity and guides *the nations* of earth. Everyone comes to the festival because God works in the history of all nations. Let us continue to join our voices in a global hymn of Easter praise!

# Preschool Chatter

We cannot believe we are starting our last month of school for the year. It has been such a fun school year. In the month of April, the children were very busy learning flowers, the Easter story, and pond life. Some highlights of our month were planting sunflowers, learning the Easter story with a palm parade through the church, a visit from Miss Megan from the public library, and finally some outside time that included playground time.

We are really looking forward to our spring field trip this year which will be at Dodge Nature Center on May 16. We will be learning about life on the farm. A special treat this year we will be offering a pizza lunch after the trip to our students and chaperones. Thank you to everyone who supported our RaiseRight fundraiser to help cover this trip and special lunch for our students.

Our summer goal for RaiseRight will be to put money back into our scholarship fund to help struggling families. Normally this fund is used for a monthly need if families fall on hard times. We did have a family that fell on very hard times and with the support of our ministry team we were able to offer them a bigger scholarship this year to help them be able to still attend preschool! We are truly grateful for the support the congregation has given us through RaiseRight to do things otherwise we would not have been able to do! Remember that with RaiseRight if you shop at Cub/Walmart, etc. on a weekly/monthly basis, buying these cards for face value and/or reloading them will cost you nothing extra and really helps us out.

During the month of April, we also had parent teacher conferences. This is an important time in the spring particularly to talk with families about their child's progress. It is amazing to see how much these children progress and grow in the eight months we have had them in our school. Many of our students will be heading off to kindergarten this fall and it is a great opportunity for teachers to let parents know what to expect during the next exciting transition for their children.

As we begin to finish off this school year we are also already looking forward to the next one. Enrollment for fall is underway. Current numbers for next year are a little lower than where they were at this point last year. We do continue to see the number of children in the area declining. It remains a concern for our little program to have enough students enrolling to cover operating expenses. If you know anyone looking for a preschool, please share our information. # Stewardship Notes...

The message below is an urgent one, coming from Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota to Lutheran congregations in Minnesota. With federal funds having been stopped for refugee resettlement, LSS has been caught short of serving the forty-five families who arrived just before the freeze. It becomes our Stewardship call for May. See instructions below:



An urgent need has been brought to St. Philip's from Lutheran Social Services of Minnesota. Forty-five refugee families arrived in Minneapolis just before federal funding for such purposes was stopped. Refugee families brought by LSS to America are thoroughly reviewed and are eager to achieve full resettlement and the expected responsibilities that follow.

LSS is requesting financial support to support the housing costs of forty-five families. LSS, estimates a need of \$110,000 to continue a stable transition of the forty-five families into Minnesota's communities.

St. Philip's is asked, as one of many congregations to help meet the housing costs of the refugee families through the summer. SPLC is an ongoing supporter of LSS in its annual budgeted giving. In these unique times however, St. Philip's, and/or its members are being given the opportunity to respond over and above that giving from our personal response of "God's Abiding Abundance."

Personal giving should be done by check, or other means payable to St. Philip's, with "LSS Refugee Appeal" on the memo line. All giving should be received by St. Philip's by May 15. Special envelopes can be found on the kiosk, or mail your gift to the church at St. Philip's Lutheran Church, 1401 15th Street West, Hastings, MN 55033

God's blessings to you in your contemplation and prayerful consideration of this opportunity.
