Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tested by the devil. He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterward he was famished.

Matthew 4:1-2



Here we find our Lord, Jesus in the wilderness being tempted by the devil. After His baptism by John the Baptist, Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to fast for forty days and forty nights. The scene is desolate and rugged, with rocky terrain and sparse vegetation surrounding them. The sun beats down relentlessly, adding to the harshness of the environment.

As Jesus fasts and prays, Satan approaches Him, seeking to tempt Him. The devil challenges Jesus to prove His divinity by turning stones into bread, to test God's protection by throwing Himself off a high point, and to worship him in exchange for all the kingdoms of the world. Jesus, however, resists each temptation by quoting scripture and reaffirming His commitment to God.

This intense encounter in the wilderness serves as a pivotal moment in Jesus' ministry, showcasing Christ's unwavering faith and resolve in the face of temptation. The struggle between good and evil is palpable in this barren landscape, as Jesus demonstrates His obedience to God's will and His victory over the temptations of the devil.

This verse recounts a crucial moment in the life of Jesus, where he shows incredible strength and resilience by fasting for 40 days and nights, despite facing intense temptation from the devil. Through this act, Jesus demonstrates his commitment to his faith and his ability to overcome worldly temptations. But what does this mean for us?

It serves as a powerful example of the importance of spiritual discipline and resisting temptation, even in the face of adversity. Jesus's example reminds us of the strength that comes from faith and the ability to overcome challenges through perseverance. It also highlights the idea that temptations are a part of life, but it is up to us to resist them and stay true to our beliefs.

So, as we reflect on this verse, let us be inspired by Jesus's unwavering faith and determination, and strive to emulate his strength in overcoming our own temptations and challenges. We can navigate through the trials that come our way and emerge stronger on the other side with faith and perseverance.

The season of Lent begins on February 18 with our Ash Wednesday service at 7 pm. This Lenten season we will be using the theme "Forty for Life". The number forty is a noteworthy number in the Scriptures. Forty will be a journeying number, a passage number, from death to life. That's why the church chose forty days for this Lenten season, this season of the death of Jesus to the life of Easter. This Lenten season we will reflect upon five different times in Scripture where the number forty is significant.



We will again be using Holden Evening Prayer at these services. Plan on making mid-week worship a part of your Lenten discipline. We will see you there!

Adult Forums for February

The Adult Spiritual Growth team strongly encourages all congregation members to attend the annual meeting on February 1. There will be no adult forum following worship service that day.

For the rest of February, we will offer a series of forums on the church's work in Tanzania. On February 8, Jennie Thomas or guest will provide an overview of the St. Paul Synod's mission in Tanzania and our sister diocese in Iringa. On February 15, we will take a break when Krista Lind, deacon and assistant to Bishop Lull, will speak generally on her work in the church.

Jim Dontje and Laura Lindell have done community development work in agriculture, water supply and education in Burkina Faso, (in West Africa); Papua, Indonesia; and Rwanda (in Central Africa). In the US, Jim worked on environmental sustainability and education at Berea College in Kentucky and Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, Minnesota, while Laura taught English language learners in the St. Paul and LeSueur-Henderson school districts. Since retirement, they have been living in Tanga, Tanzania, where Laura spent the early years of her life. They will share some about life in Tanga and their perspective on Tanzania's strengths and challenges. Jim will also talk about his volunteer work with an agricultural NGO on solar food drying and micro-irrigation.



Our series on Tanzania will continue into March when Kirsten Levorson, director of Bega Kwa Bega, joins us March 1. Other speakers are planned for additional forums in March. Stay tuned!

On Sunday, February 1 at 10:45 am, St. Philip's Lutheran Church will conduct our congregation's annual meeting. At this meeting we will accept reports from our staff ministry team and lay ministry team leaders, vote on lay leadership for the coming year and approve a budget. We will also be voting on how to distribute our tithe of miscellaneous income between various local and broader ministries.

There will again be an option to participate via Zoom. This was made possible by a council action in 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic and then a later change to our constitution. There will also be opportunities to discuss the budget on the Sunday prior to the annual meeting through Zoom meetings as well.

While our fundamental values are grounded in Christianity, we value each individual's journey of healing, change, and transformation. We have a "Recovery First" value system that places the utmost value and belief in each individual's ability to achieve and maintain long-term recovery. We know because we live it every day!

Ministries Beyond Hastings/Dakota County:

() Center for Changing Lives Frogtown/ Rondo, a ministry of Lutheran Social Services

Thus far, \$7.2m has been raised towards the \$7.5m goal, and construction is underway and we hope to open the building for children and youth next spring/summer.

The facility will include:

- * 19 apartments for youth – (and their children) –who are experiencing instability and homelessness
- * classrooms, *an exercise room
- * a “hang out” lounge, *a laundry room
- * a “drop in” center for youth in crisis, including a shower, a clothing closet, a food pantry, etc.
- * a big, shared kitchen and eating area
- * LSS staff offices for: behavioral health, employment services, financial counseling and housing services.

This center will truly be a beacon of hope in the Frogtown/Rondo neighborhood. We are so excited about it!

() Green Lake Lutheran Ministries – Water’s Edge Campaign

GLLM is entering Phase 2 of their Water’s Edge Campaign. Part of this \$3.3-million-dollar campaign includes site updates that will be focused on enhancing both the camper experience and foundational infrastructure, ensuring our facilities are safe, accessible and primed for ministry impact. While not outwardly grand, these projects-including paving the Green Lake Bible Camp parking lot, upgrading camper bathhouses and summer camp lodge at Shores of St. Andrew Bible Camp, improving heating and cooling systems, preserving Camp House cabins, and renovating camper cabins and retreat rooms - are crucial to supporting our mission's longevity.

Funds will also be used for organizational strategy planning, debt reduction, and rebranding. As part of Phase 1, the Village at Shores of St. Andrew was completely renovated including redesigning the Lodge’s floorplan to accommodate all levels of accessibility and make the Village a place of rest, growth, learning and spiritual rejuvenation.

Shopping is easy, convenient, and open to everyone. The Mobile Market makes stops around the metro area each week. Each year they serve nearly 10,000 customers at sites around St. Paul and Minneapolis.

How great is that? Our church mortgage has tumbled down to \$1,530,000 from its start point of \$2.7MM. Let’s all also lean into “growing our faith”, by taking part in adult education opportunities and the Sunday morning adult education class after worship. They are very enlightening. Thank you again, fellow members, for being on our productive journey together.

Lista Klocow

Twenty-four Years of Service to St. Philip's Lutheran Church!

Lista Klocow began being St. Philip's office manager 24 years ago. Coming through a temp agency in May of 2002, she moved on to staff status in six months. Pastor Ed Frederick was the pastor. Other pastors Lista served with were Leslie Fox, David Wrightsman, and since 2015, Gregory Geier. Interim pastoral care during Lista's time were Dana Peterson, Gordon Gathright, and Ralph Olsen. Her first fellow staff members were Noreen Swanson, Ruth Bloom, Lori Best, Ellen Diischer, Kathy Wolpers, Diane Keller, Barb Jorenby, Mary Ellen Fox, Sandi Hamman and Heidi Nelson.



In 2006, Lista was given a two-month medical leave to address the onset of breast cancer. She recalls the strong support of the congregation, through visits on her porch, and many cards assuring her their prayers for a full recovery.

When asked about an exciting time, Lista recalls the 2012-13, building expansion. The drama of the St. Philip's reaching that point in its growth included Lista's everyday attention. The nuances of building on a site where nothing is cancelled and a school is in session, took prudent coordination. Lista served as the prime conduit between the Building Superintendent, the building co-chair, Steve Henrichs, and the entire staff. She recalls the heavy equipment lifting pieces of the parking lot outside her window and with emotion, witnessing the lifting of the cross on the building's highest point.

List a has religiously supported every ministry team with last minute requests to help them thrive. The twenty SPLC Garage/Plant Sales were greatly aided by her "signage on request" presence during set-up week. Public events and internal meetings were scheduled by Lista with a fine eye for which room would serve the event best. SPLC volunteers and staff will miss the excellence of Lista's skills and care for the needs of everyone.

It's the congregation's wish that Lista's retirement will be a time of joy and good health. Its collective memories and the cultivation of friendship and good will that prevailed is the legacy she leaves.
